Dear Parent/Carer

I wrote to you before half term outlining the planned change to the school day for September 2021. This 'FAQs' section collates the questions raised by parents and carers over the last week as it may be of interest to all of you. Will there be less teaching time?

Students currently have 300 minutes of teaching time a day and they will maintain this in September. There will be no loss to teaching time.

How does this help address the concerns raised by OFSTED?

The OFSTED report of October 2019 recognised that teaching and learning was 'good', this good standard of teaching will continue and be enhanced by the alterations in September. Educational research and nationwide practice evidence shows how students learn better in well structured, shorter periods of time with regular revisits to recently acquired knowledge and understanding. By increasing the frequency of the lessons, students will be able to reinforce knowledge through a spiralised curriculum (returning to key concepts and knowledge) throughout their school career. The strength of teaching and learning will be enhanced, and we will have the flexibility to deliver PSHCEE once a fortnight to build on the work since OFSTED to relentlessly address all forms of bullying. In addition, Lady Lumley's staff will have greater opportunity for continuous professional development, to support interventions and to contribute to enrichment.

Is this the right time, after a pandemic, to make these changes?

The pandemic has caused so much disruption, to education and all our lives. This is absolutely the right time to re generate the curriculum and review the needs of the students in our school. As outlined above these alterations allow us to focus on high quality teaching and learning, tailored interventions where necessary and to vitally re engage students in enrichment activities.

Will children have time to eat and socialise at lunchtime?

Students will have time to get their lunch, spend time whilst eating socialising and the rest of the lunch period. We will investigate providing some enrichment activities with lunch as part of our curriculum review.

How will transport work after school to allow children to access Enrichment and Intervention?

We are currently working with the bus companies to sort out the logistics for a slightly earlier finish. The alteration of timings to the day will not change access to enrichment. Currently, if students want to stay for enrichment there is the need for parents and carers to arrange transport for them. I appreciate that some families may need to make some adjustments to enable this at a slightly earlier time, hence the earliest possible communication.

Will the Sixth Form still be able to leave at lunchtime?

The students in the sixth form will be able to leave the school site at lunchtime, following the signing in and out procedure that is in place to keep them safe. The sixth form team will work with individual students, as they do now, to shape their study time to best support progress. Students in the sixth form will have a thorough induction to prepare them for Advanced Level study and to understand the different privileges and responsibilities they now have as sixth form students.

What is the motivation for this change?

Simply put, the motivation for this alteration is school improvement and relentless ambition for students to be their best.

When there is additional information to communicate such as the exact timings of the day, I will write to parents again.

Parent and Student Consultation Evening (PSCE)

On Thursday 10th June, Lady Lumley's held its first 'remote' PSCE evening for Year 10. Mr Fairclough will be asking for feedback from parents and carers on their experience and students as well. The remote parents' evenings enable appointment times to be maintained, for the dialogue to be focused and purposeful and crucially for conversations to be confidential rather than shared with other parents and students who are waiting. We hope that it has also made manging the evening easier for families as they do not need to travel into school, and the disruption this can cause to other children and dependents.

A crucial piece of information to make this technology work is for the school to have an up-to-date email address. We will be checking that we have this information before the Year 7 and 8 PSCE evening, please support us with this. Clair Foden

Outdoor Education update.

I'm delighted to update you with news about the fantastic outdoor education enrichment activities that have been recently going on at school. It's great to see such healthy numbers of our students getting involved in these activities and really pushing themselves. The **Duke of Edinburgh's Award** students have been incredibly busy. With other 140 students from Years 10, 11, 12 and 13 preparing for their forthcoming expeditions, a lot has been going on. **Year 10** students have been learning about expedition equipment and how to use their DofE online accounts during Thursday tutor times. Our outgoing **Year 11 and 13** cohort are finishing the school year in style and have been planning their Bronze and Gold qualifying expedition routes. The **Year 12** have been making the most of their enrichment sessions and this week took part in expedition first aid. This involved learning about accident procedure, CPR and the use of a defibrillator. We also



looked at treating burns and cuts and finished off with a simulated first aid triage incident!

Joined by **Mr Reynolds and Miss Heyes** we have been very lucky to welcome some motivated and resilient students to our **Outdoor Education** club for the Year 8 bubble. The club has been so popular that we have had to run 3

separate sessions for the 35 students! This week was mountain biking and what a soggy event it was. Torrential rain and relentless wind didn't put off our students and we had great fun navigating the mountain bike trails of Dalby Forest. We even managed to relate our cornering technique to the river meanders topic Year 8 students have been studying this year. After half-term the club will be heading out on the water to sample some canoeing and kayaking.





Did you know?

Lady Lumley's School has its very own **bunkhouse** in Rosedale Abbey. The well-appointed residence can sleep up to 20 people and is available to hire for groups and families. The centre has all the mod cons you would expect from a modern bunkhouse and is a great base for exploring this special area. Instrumental Music at Lady Lumley's School

In Music, Year 7 and 8 students have begun to explore the possibilities of instruments other than the keyboard. Year 8 have worked with Puerto Rican 'bomba percussion' to create a polyrhythmic performance as part of their Music of the Caribbean topic. Years 7 and 8 are both learning a guitar riff as part of their ongoing performance projects on Don't Stop Believin' (Year 7) and Three Little Birds (Year 8). We will be using the school guitar set for this, but, if students own a guitar they are welcome (and encouraged) to bring it in on the day of their music lesson. Students can store instruments in the Music Department in the morning and collect at the end of the day.

These wider instrument projects give students the opportunity to develop varied musical skills and introduce them to the exciting and enriching possibilities of learning an instrument. Following these lessons, many students have expressed an interest in furthering their musical learning by starting an instrumental or vocal lesson. North Yorkshire Music Hub provide one-to-one, paired, or small



group lessons with a specialist instrumental or vocal teacher and are taught during the school day here at Lady Lumley's. All lessons are taught to a timetable before, during and after school in the music practice rooms. Lessons currently offered in school are: saxophone, clarinet, flute, violin, viola, cello, double bass, trumpet, cornet, trombone, tenor horn, tuba, electric/acoustic guitar, bass guitar, ukulele, drum kit, piano and singing. 20-30 Minute lessons



work out at approximately £6.40 per small group lesson and £12.00 per one-to-one, billed termly by the Music Hub and there are discounts available (please check the website below for futher details) and students entitled to free school meals are also entitled to a free instrumental/vocal lesson. The early years of key stage 3 are an excellent time to start learning and set students up with the instrumental or vocal skills they need to continue Music at GCSE. Furthermore, recent research published in the Journal of Educational Psychology states that students who engage with music, and particularly instrumental or vocal lessons perform better in their wider academic subjects. Learning to play an instrument enhances memory, spatial reasoning (the ability to imagine, differentiate, understand and apply concepts), dexterity and literacy skills whilst of course offering live-lasting and enriching musical opportunities.
