Philosophy Task

Watch this debate between Bill Nye (the Science Guy) and Dr Ken Ham, Creation Scientist.

This debate has had over 7 million views and is very well produced.

If you watch from 14 minutes you will see Bill Nye and Ken Ham being introduced. Bill Nye is a famous US TV presenter of science/nature programmes, and Ken Ham works for the 'Answers in Genesis' organisation.

Structure of the talk

The debate is quite long and so you may wish to watch in stages. They each give an introductory presentation and then each have a right of reply.

- Ken Ham starts at 15 minutes
- Bill Nye starts at 57 minutes
- The right of reply starts at 1 hour 28

Read these two chapters:

<u>Chapter 1 - Utilitarianism</u>

Chapter 5 – Fletcher's Situation Ethics



After reading chapters 1, and 5, summarise:

- Who the main philosopher/s involved were;
- What their ethical theory was based on (happiness? Love? Self interest?)
- On the next page, there is an ethical dilemma. Using your knowledge of utilitarianism and situation ethics, decide what should be done for each theory which decision generates the greatest happiness for the greatest number? What decision is the most loving thing to do? Why is doing this difficult?

At the end of each chapter there are some questions to reflect on (Issues to Consider). You can have a go at these if you feel you have understood enough, but do not worry, we are going to spend 5 lessons on each theory. This is just an introduction!

Spam Filtering – an ethical dilemma!

You are the network administrator for a rather large company. You have a young family and need your job to support them. You monitor the emails for the organization.

One day you get a helpdesk request from a staff member asking for an email to get released. Normally it's standard procedure except this time the request has come from the wife of a very good friend of yours. You recognize the name on the helpdesk request so quickly attend to the problem. As part of the procedure you need to manually open up the email to ensure that it isn't spam, so you do and you discover that it certainly isn't spam. You find that it's actually an email to your friend's wife from her lover. You scan the rest of the contents of the email and there is no doubt that she has been having an affair for some time now.

You release the email, but you can't decide what to do. You're initial reaction is to call your friend up and tell him about the email, however you quickly realize that company policy is very strict about revealing the contents of confidential emails of staff members regardless of the contents and unless someone's life is in immediate danger, under no circumstances are you permitted to reveal the information.

In any case you know that revealing this information presents great risk, because even if you don't do it directly, there is a good chance that the dots will be joined somewhere along the line and you will be found out. However, you feel that by not telling you friend that you are aiding his wife get away with adultery and this troubles you greatly. What do you do?

<u>Judaism Task</u>

The Judaism task is very straightforward.

I want you to produce, either on paper or on a document, a mind map – as detailed as you can make it – to include everything you know about Judaism already. Lumley's students may have an advantage here as we have done Judaism at GCSE, but if you are from a different school, you can use BBC Bitesize to help you. Please make it as colourful as you can (I love colour on notes) and you can add pictures if you are artistic (or even if you are not!)
