Strategic Direction and Coast and Vale Learning Trust

At the start of each half term, I outline to parents/carers five of the key areas that we are all working on. Five of our key foci for this half term and beyond:

- Maintain the momentum in the construction of 'Sharepoint' across the school and Trust to support collaboration, teaching and learning and communication. The first stage to be ready to communicate with students and parents in term two. Feedback on the pilot schemes with interactive screens to inform next strategic investment.
- Create a clear and coherent system for student leadership that re energises the House System.
- Helping students to know more and remember more through 'retrieval' work in lessons and at home.
- Invest in the Sixth Form provision through Options preferences to enable a coherent and efficient curriculum to be established.
- Continue to raise awareness with students about what bullying is, how to report it and what happens next. Utilise 'Anti-Bullying Week' to raise the profile of this vital message.

Senior Maths Challenge

Right after receiving the amazing news about the Maths Olympiad for Girls results, we received more good news about the Senior Maths Challenge.

The Senior Maths Challenge is open to all our mathematicians in Year 12 and 13 and is a 90-minute paper consisting of 25, increasingly difficult, multiple-choice questions. Students have to be careful in their selection as wrong answers are awarded negative marks.

As always, we were very impressed with how our students performed. In Year 12 special mention goes to **Alex Beeson** and **Emily Goodfellow** who achieved the Silver Award and to **Louis Bouvier**, **John Felgate**, **Robert Mackintosh**, and **Matthew Simpson** who achieved the Bronze Award. In Year 13 congratulations to **Molly Harland**, **Felicity Lloyd**, **Rachel Lowther**, and **Jack Magson**, who all achieved the Silver Award and to **Saul Bateman**, and to **Alex Loosley** who achieved the Bronze Award.

Student Leadership

Over the course of the last two weeks, I have had several opportunities to discuss the rejuvenation of the house system with staff, students and parents.

During assemblies, I have explained to students how the house system developed at Lady Lumley's, having originally had the 'greens' and the 'golds' in PE lessons it was decided to formally name them Acland and Hainsworth house. Once the site moved to where we are now on Swainsea Lane a further house, Highfield was added to accommodate the number of students we had in the school in 1952 and finally adding Hainsworth house in 1973. I shared with students the work I have been doing with Mr John Smith local historian and author of The History of Lady Lumley's and former Head of History at the school. Together we looked to find the names of the two new houses, again to add the school as we expand. Leslie House will be introduced to mark Miss Leslie, the first female teacher at Lady Lumley's school in 1905. At a time when it was not deemed necessary to educate girls, Lady Lumley's had a curriculum delivered for three girls in the community. Her career was short lived as she married. At this time women, married women left their employment, but the impact Miss Leslie had on the school will be recognised. As will the long service of Mrs D Addinall, who worked at the school for 35 years as an English teacher with the introduction of Addinall house. It was my privilege to have met Mrs Addinall's sister and hear of the amazing contributions she made to the school and the community. It has also been lovely to hear from former students and families in the community who are thrilled to have the house dedicated to her name.



Students from Year 7 to 13 now can apply for Leadership positions within the school. Mr Carter, Head of Sixth Form and Mr Fairclough Leader of Key stage 4 are looking forward to receiving applications for the position of Head Teacher's Ambassador and House

Leader. The successful students will be the driving force for leadership throughout the school. Students will receive the support and training to lead their houses in meetings and plan activities. Once the core model is established, we look forward to developing opportunities across the curriculum, Outdoor Education, Sport and the Arts.

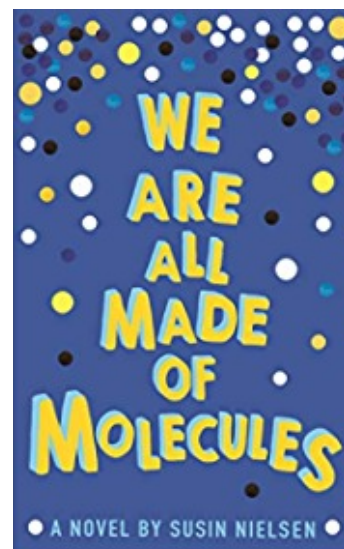
What are the most important themes for you in this novel?
