April news from the Library

Welcome to the summer term! Of course it's not quite summer and there's still a nip in the air so the library isn't short of break and lunch time visitors. I thought I'd share some pictures of the various ways students are engaged in the library – they make use of computers (sometimes even for homework!) they play Genius Square and other logic puzzles; they do some mindful colouring; they play chess; and sometimes I catch them reading! Whatever they are engaged in, we always try to remember that the library is a place where they should feel comfortable and safe and so behaviour expectations are designed to keep it that way.



The display on the board as you enter the library highlights some of the new books in our collection. We have had several book tasting sessions with different year groups, and I've taken their comments about the books and created word clouds. I hope that students might use the display to help them choose a book to check out.





The book display asks students to think about a common theme in the collection – perhaps you can ask them what they think?

For most of us these would be "window books" – giving us an insight into lives that are different from our own. Reading these stories helps us to build empathy and broaden our understanding of the world.

Exam season is upon us and so access to the library will be curtailed. When students can't come to the library I plan to bring the library to them and I'll start by showing them how to access the library system using their own log in to increase their independence and use.
