Have you read Sci-Fi before?

As part of our whole-school focus on reading, on Thursday morning 60 of our Y9 students were lucky enough to be invited to a presentation by Rex Burke, a local Sci-Fi writer. As a travel writer, he's visited over 70 countries and has shifted into Sci-Fi to explore character, perspective, and other worlds. Discussing the definition of Sci-Fi, dystopian fiction, and speculative fiction (where writers imagine what COULD happen) he got straight to the heart of what makes Sci-Fi amazing: its ability to pull us in with classic tales of storytelling that just happens to be set in space. From cryostasis to teenagers, "Orphan Planet" deals with space travel; human stories and sometime, a little bit of camping. WHAT'S IN YOUR VAPE?

There is a worrying trend across the country but also in the local area of vapes containing dangerous substances resulting in children being admitted to hospital. Please discuss with your children the concerns and dangers of vaping.

Something strange is happening with vapes. Imagine the scene. A group of teenage children are gathered in a



school toilet sharing a vape, passing it around. They've done this before. It's no big deal. But suddenly they feel ill. Their hearts race and their heads spin. One of them collapses. An ambulance is called. Before going any further, it's worth pointing out that vaping rarely leads to anyone being rushed to hospital – but it does happen, and it's happening here in North Yorkshire.

In May 2023, a 16-year-old boy was rushed to A&E after suddenly falling ill vaping at school. The same month, four other boys became violently sick elsewhere in North Yorkshire. Two collapsed and one was found convulsing. All recovered, but it was very frightening.

This is happening elsewhere in the UK, as well. A few weeks after these incidents in North Yorkshire, a pupil in Manchester passed out while vaping. A few days later, pupils at two separate schools near Southampton were rushed to hospital experiencing heart problems and seizures.

These frightening incidents have had parents, teachers, and young people all asking the same thing: What was in those vapes?

Attendance

Is My Child Too Ill For School?

As the season of flu and colds approaches, it can sometimes be difficult for parents to know whether it is appropriate to send their child to school. Whilst there are clearly cases when it is in the best interests of a child to keep them at home, at other times it may be perfectly fine to allow them to attend school as normal.

Fortunately, the NHS has produced a clear and helpful guide for parents, explaining what to do if your child is ill – including if they have tested positive for COVID-19: <u>https://www.nhs.uk/live-well/is-my-child-too-ill-for-school/</u>

Please also remember that if your child is unable to attend school, it is important to contact school as early as possible to report they will not be attending and to explain the reason why. This can be done in a variety of ways:

1. Call the main school number on 01751 472846 and choose Option 1 for Attendance.

- 2. Email school at admin@ll.coastandvale.academy
- 3. Report your child's absence using the Class Charts app.
- 4. Visit school Reception to report your child's absence in person.

If you have any further queries about school attendance, illness or absence, then a member of the Attendance team will be very happy to assist.

More September News from the library

The National Literacy Trust recently published their report on children and young people's reading, based on the results to their annual survey. You can read the report in full if you follow this <u>link</u> but I wanted to share a couple of points:

Not surprising, but of great concern was this statistic:

Of course, our mission at Lady Lumley's is to increase and encourage engagement with reading for pleasure and we are working across the school to this end. The survey also showed the many ways children feel they benefit from reading, from learning new things about the world, to gaining a sense of well-being and feelings of happiness and confidence. "Just 2 in 5 (43.4%) 8- to 18-year-olds told us in early 2023 that they enjoyed reading in their free time. This is the lowest level of reading enjoyment we have recorded since 2005."

What would make children and young people aged 8 to 18 want to read?

 When asked what would make them want to read, most (38.4%, or 2 in 5) said that having books recommended to them would do this. 1 in 3 said that being given books (32.1%) or having books that represent them (31.5%) would make them want to read. 1 in 4 (23.3%) said that they would read more if their friends or family talked about books, while 1 in 6 (17.6%) said that seeing someone they look up to read or talk about reading would do this.



A final take-away that gave me hope was knowing that we can all help to increase engagement with reading, both at school and at home, by talking about books, demonstrating our own enjoyment with reading and by putting books into the hands of our young ones.
